ELEMENT	DETAILS
Name and Contact Information	 Your Name Current and accurate contact information Bonus: Use the same header you used on your resume to make it match and create a unified look.
Opening Paragraph	 Introduce yourself and your areas of interest: What population or type of work are you interested in as a Social Worker? Name the skills, experiences, or achievements that would make you a great practicum student to host – expand on these more in your middle paragraphs
Middle Paragraph 1: Experience Highlights	 Use specific examples or stories of times you successfully demonstrated your ability to perform a skill/experience. Use the STAR method, if helpful (see below.)
Middle Paragraph 2: Learning Goals	 Explain what you hope to learn from your practicum experience. Connect how these learning goals align with your long-term goals as a Social Worker that you mentioned in your opening paragraph and/or to the work you hope to do at an agency.
Conclusion	 Reiterate your interests + what you have to offer. Thank them for reviewing your materials. If you included your contact information in your header, you don't need to include it again.
Formatting	 Use the same formatting (ex: font, spacing, etc.) as your resume. Margins: No less than 0.5 inch. Single spaced, one page, use paragraphs.

COVER LETTER WRITING

Using the STAR Method

- S: Situation What was the context?
- T: Task What was the task you did (at a broad level?)
- A: Action What were the individual actions you took to complete that task?
- R: Result/Relevancy What was the result of that task? And/or how is what you learned from this task relevant to the job position you're applying for?

Example

Situation:

As a Care Coordinator at Communities in Schools, I collaborated with families from underserved backgrounds to plan and implement wraparound support for families and their students. While working with families on obtaining housing resources, I realized that a lot of the language and jargon that housing applications use were confusing.

Task:

In response, I put together a single page guide that...

Action:

...broke down complex terms into simple language. Families were able to use the guide to quickly reference and understand unfamiliar terms. Additionally, I worked with other staff members to translate the guides into different languages.

Result:

As a result, families reported back that they were able to navigate housing applications with more confidence.

Relevancy:

By putting together this guide, I gained skills in collaboration, knowledge in housing terminology, and experience in recognizing and meeting my client's unique needs.
