Certificate of Social Work Practice in Disability Studies

The School of Social Work offers MSSW students the opportunity to graduate with a certificate in Disability Studies. This certificate program prepares both Clinical and APP students to work with disabled communities in various settings, including healthcare programs, case management, nonprofits, schools, and policy work. Coursework emphasizes historical perspectives of the disability rights movement, current perspectives of disability justice, critical analysis of current models of disability, intersectional approaches to advocacy and policy, and is grounded in interprofessional education and interdisciplinary collaboration.

Certificate Requirements

The Disability Studies certificate program is composed of one anchor course, Making Systems Work for People with Disabilities, elective and selective coursework, 20 hours of professional development, and an approved practicum placement. All coursework counted toward earning a certificate must be taken at the graduate level at the School of Social Work or through approved out-of-department classes. The student is responsible for documenting that all requirements for the certificate have been successfully completed. Throughout enrollment in the certificate program, the certificate coordinator will provide ongoing support, including guidance on course selection, practicum alignment, and progress tracking to ensure students stay on track toward completion.

Approved Practicum Placement

Certificate students may complete their practicum in settings that serve or engage with their population of interest, including specialized agencies or broader organizations offering relevant services. Social Work Practice in Disability Studies certificate students will complete one official practicum focused on disability or disability advocacy social work practice. The placement is a key educational component, providing students with hands-on learning and an opportunity to apply and integrate classroom-based knowledge. This placement may occur in the student's first or final practicum experience. Securing a final practicum placement is a competitive process. Students must confirm with the certificate coordinator that their placement meets the requirements of the certificate program. Because of external factors, such as funding, placement is competitive and not guaranteed at any specific agency. Regardless of placement, all students gain valuable experience through specialized coursework, practicum opportunities, and faculty mentorship, preparing them for effective practice across various social work environments.

Additional Proposed Coursework

Certificate students in the Clinical concentration will select three of their five choices from the suggested course options on page two. Students in the APP concentration will select three of their four choices from the suggested course options on page two. Other courses may be approved as offered, through consultation with the certificate coordinator.

Professional Development

Certificate students are required to engage in a minimum of 20 hours of professional development during the course of their graduate program, either through conference attendance, training participation and/or research project participation that relates to Disability Studies. Professional



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development hours must be approved by the certificate coordinator prior to the certificate being awarded and may not count toward fulfillment of requirements of another course or program at the School.
